Whatever you call it,

check it for leaks at least twice a year.

Leaking toilets can waste thousands of gallons of water a month, leading to higher bills.

Sometimes toilet leaks are easy to hear, but many times they can be silent – making them easy to miss.

Here's how to check your toilet for leaks:

- 1 Remove the toilet tank lid.
- 2 Drop the attached dye into the tank. (10 drops of food coloring also works.)
- 3 Put the lid back on. Do not flush.
- 4 Wait 20 minutes.
- 5 Check your toilet bowl. If you see colored water, you have a leak. If not, you don't.
